

U7: Piece by Piece

There's been almost as much drama and suspense in the release of Ultima VII as in the game itself. Even now, unseen workers are scrambling in faraway warehouses to make sure U7's arrival classifies as a gaming "event."

The news came on Shipping Eve during an in-house verification. About 20% of the Disk 2's of the 5.25" version were no good, a bad batch from the duplicator. The call to StarPak (ORIGIN's Colorado warehouse subcontrac-

tor) was no picnic. "They had just finished putting the last label on the last case—paperwork, shipping forms, everything was complete," according to accounting mogul Mark Chandler. That meant every order—hundreds upon hundreds of case packs—had to be re-opened and separated before the delivery trucks came.

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
Bio Double Header



"Windows World" is an entire exhibit hall unto itself and once again I was able to witness the second coming of Bill Gates. He rode in on the wings of Windows 3.1, already being lauded as one of the best upgrades of the year. He maintained a high profile for the duration of the show, talking technojargon with the industry top dogs and econospeak with Chicago business leaders.


Meanwhile, tucked away in the Multimedia Showcase, Underworld was making some noise of its own. ORIGIN latched on to a comfy spot offered to us in the MediaVision booth. If you're not familiar with MediaVision, it makes a new sound card called the Pro Audio Spectrum Plus. It's 100% Sound Blaster compatible and therefore 100% ORIGIN compatible.

The attack plan was exquisitely simple: draw in a crowd with the U7 intro sequence, laughing off the "Coming Christmas 1991" as a typo. Then, with the ice broken, load up the Underworld demo. To a person, the crowd found the technology spellbinding. You have to remember, these are people who had been wandering aimlessly for hours looking at WordPerfect and Fox Pro. Underworld running smooth as glass on the 486/ 33 proved to be just as addictive as it was at CES.

Some attendees had already bought, played and finished the game. "I want to thank you," one bleary-eyed guy said, "I got Underworld two days ago and I haven't slept since." Another lamented as to how Ultima VI strained the relationship between him and his fiancee and Underworld would probably finish it off.

The anticipation for U7 was running high as well, even though some people still looked skeptical when told it would be shipping this week. What cynics!

Strike Commander continues to hold the top spot as Most People Ready to Play game. Due to limitations with the Pro Audio

Spectrum Plus and the configuration of the demo, Strike wasn't shown at COMDEX. As they say, "You have to dance with the one who brung ya." Several people expressed their disappointment, especially those from competing software companies.

Results from these shows are hard to measure immediately. Karl and Anita drummed up plenty of excitement with ORIGIN's current distributors/retailers and knocked the socks off of some potential customers. From a press standpoint, COMDEX draws different journalists than CES. Some magazines (like Business Week, to drop a name) are looking at entertainment software in a new light and thinking about upcoming feature stories.

There wasn't much truly ground-breaking technology to be seen at COMDEX. Pen computing is gaining momentum as the next consumer craze. Apple did not have its voice-recognition technology in plain view, although it was probably lurking behind closed

and locked doors somewhere in the exhibit hall.

The Fall COMDEX (a much larger show) takes place November 16-20 in Las Vegas. While CES is geared toward Christmas retail sales, COMDEX is timed to coincide with businesses' fiscal years, most of which end in January or February. Point of ORIGIN will be there as well and back here with another full report.

Wing 2 Wins Again

Wing Commander 2 picked up two more awards at the prestigious European Computer Trade Show: Best Sound and Best Graphics.

In the newly-resurrected PC Entertainment (formerly Game Players PC Entertainment), Wing 2 picks up an Excellence Award but loses Game of the Year to Chuck Yeager's Air Combat (EA) and Best Arcade/Action Game to Hoverforce (Accolade).

Party Poll

Results of the Entertainment Committee Questionnaire

For the first time, the Entertainment Committee has some raw data to work with — supplied by y'all a few months back in the form of an E.C. Survey — in mapping future activities. The only drawback: there are so many new employees that the "never attended" category was often checked. In fact, a whopping 34% of all respondents never even attended ORIGIN's Christmas party just a few months ago because most of those folks were not on board at that time!

Here's a rundown of some of the most salient highlights of the survey:

Food for Thought

The Wednesday Cookout was a winner: 76% of those who responded rated the cookouts "good, very good, or great." These weenie roasts garnered the single highest "great" vote at 30%, and it was the only item that absolutely not a single soul graded as "fair or poor." So, for that 24% of

"never attended," ya really oughtta consider cancelling those calorie-balanced snob lunches at the Metropolitan Club downtown and hang with the ORIGIN gang at its midweek fat feast. It's the place to be! Check the "Entertainment" BBS for dates, times and costs.

Is Everybody Happy?

Happy Hours did pretty well, too, (61% positive rating) with sandwiches and veggies (62% positive) and pizzas (63% positive) being the current food favorites. 30% actually rated Happy Hours "fair or poor," so the E.C. is trying to think of ways to make them better. One thing that's been done is to cut WAY back on speeches and announcements in this setting, favoring Point Of Origin as a preferred vehicle for "broadcast" communication with employees. Except for periodic special occasions, management has agreed to make Richard the sole/primary spokesperson at

these events, and even limit him to one significant 5-10 minute topic per gathering. Hopefully this will put more of the "happy" back into Happy Hours.

At the time of the questionnaire, all Happy Hours had traditionally been held somewhere on office premises, so that's the only type rated. However, enough people (41%) expressed some interest in trying to stage Happy Hours at area clubs and restaurants, that the E.C. figured they'd give it a try. In a future E.C. opinion poll, you'll be able to further rate the experimentation with these fun-and-funky off-site locales. But since quite a few employees said they were either "not interested" (33%) or off-site places were a "bad idea" (14%), don't expect this to be the usual fare.

So-So-Social

Social Hours clocked in with a less-enthusiastic 53% favorable response, which is

why they got axed from the lineup until/unless a more popular angle can be thought up. (Any votes for a "Stars Of The Watering Hole" DEBATE HOUR pontificating the essence of religion, politics and corn flakes? Nahhhh...)

More offbeat activities, like decorating contests, thus far have proved to appeal to a more discriminating clientele (50% enjoyed Halloween dress-up day; 45% dug the Xmas door deal) compared with the clearly mass-employee appeal of FOOD events. In response, the E.C. now has formed a task force to investigate using edible clothing or materials in future such lunatic-fringe events (use your imagination).

Feelings about other current or possible "social activities" produced a mixed bag of responses. People seemed about equally split over whether the suggested events were "good-to-great" versus "fair-to-don't care." Even FOOD-oriented ideas like Ice Cream Sundaes and Pizza Parties got a ho-hum response. Birthday Banners and Ship Parties mustered the most enthusiasm with 50% and 54%, respectively, saying they were good or better. And it was clear that folks would rather "ship" than "crunch" — even with FOOD at steak!(sic) — as 25% said Ship Parties were "ggggreat!", compared with only 15% saying the same for Crunch Mode Parties.

Out to Lunch

Hot summer picnics were definitely cool stuff among those folks who've been here long enough to ever attend one. Well over two-thirds of our family picnickers rated these events highly, with Westlake Beach slightly edging out Bull Creek as a "great" outdoor party setting. Enthusiasm for other proposed picnic locations this summer sent the YogiBearometer spinning: 55% and 57% wanna play at Lake Travis or Zilker Park, respectively! About 30% said they were "not really interested" in picnics. No one thought they were a bad idea; the rest just "didn't know" or had "no opinion."


Misc., Etc.

On the subject of other types of future outings, responses were splattered all over the countryside. Organized group Movie excursions captured the fancy of 74%, followed by Concerts at 64%, a Halloween Party at 61%, and Plays at (57%). Sucking wind on interest were: St. Patrick's Day and Valentine's Day parties (notice we didn't have any), attending Aquafest or the Pecan Street Festival as one big family, Mexican Border Shopping (never said for WHAT), and Eeyores Birthday (go figure!). Floating gently in the middle with more split-decisions were: River Rafting (50% interested), constructing an ORIGIN flotilla for the Town Lake Raft Race (47%), invading Six Flags (46%) and Sea World

(44%), and going on Camping Trips together (41%)...now THERE's a scary thought.

Probably the most popular item on the list was ORIGIN T-Shirts. 60% definitely wanted them, 40% didn't know how to ask for them (they said "not really interested"), but absolutely no one thought they were a bad idea or had no opinion! Guess management better order up a load of them Beefy-T's! Wonder if they come in an edible variety so we can kill two birds with one stone?

Runes of Virtue for Game Boy, ORIGIN's most scrutinized game of all time, officially signed off two weeks ago at Nintendo's USA office in Redmond, Washington, roughly one year after our own signoff.

Perhaps the deciding factor was Alan Gardner and Gary Scott Smith sitting just outside the test room. "They told us we should know something by 11:30 in the morning, so we were sitting there watching the clock and counting down the minutes," Alan recalled. "Then, at 11:27, they just walked in and said, 'Y'all are done." A rather unceremonious end to a fairly lengthy process. "But I didn't care," Alan said, "we were just happy that it was over and FCI (ORIGIN's publishing license for

this product) would finally be able to manufacture and ship, because it's really a great game."

Making the trip to Redmond worked so well that it will be the modus operandi for ORIGIN's next round of work-in-progress Nintendo development projects like Ultima V, first submitted to Pony Canyon for videotaping and evaluation about 5 months ago. After that, Runes of Virtue 2 and Ultima 7 for SNES will be steaming down the pipeline.

Look for the current Runes game to hopefully hit American shelves in about 3 months. One last final-final-final signoff by Nintendo in Japan is not expected to be a problem, Alan says, since Runes has already been in release there for several months.



StarPak's herculean effort managed to salvage 60% of the original 60,000 rollout. All of the 3.5" units headed out the door right on schedule. The 5.25" version will ship this week. Meanwhile, all of the major retailers—Software Etc., Egghead, Electronics Boutique, Babbages and others—have the 3.5" versions on their shelves and report brisk sales. Sales titan Karl Kabler has already heard from one store in New York. "They got in 24 copies first thing Thursday morning and sold half of them in the first 30 minutes."

Of course, most stores already had loads of customer backorders, so all they had to do was ring these folks up and let them know U7 had arrived. We'll bring you updated sales news as the numbers come rolling in.
