In many cases, these are nothing more than expanded demos, meant to whet the gamer's appetite and get him (or her) to buy the full-blown product. They're sold at ridiculously-low prices, even dropping below the \$10 mark.

Earlier this week, Tandy Titan (and all-around Nice Guy) Karl Kabler hit the Price Club Show at the Anaheim Convention Center. Basically, the PCS is a consumer show, but it's only open to Price Club members, both businesses and individuals. "It was a great show," Karl said. "There were about 15,000 people there. To give you an idea, last year, we pioneered the show; we were the only software company to be there. This year, piggy-backed on our success was Disney, Broderbund, My Software, Microsoft and The Learning Company. It shows that the West Coast group, at least, is serious about moving into the mass market computer and software business." In other sales news, Bundling Boss Anita Lockamy inked a deal for a minimum 10,000 units of Ultima **VI. Personal Computer Solutions** plans to put together a "Fun Pack" which includes U6, a Gravis Pad (like a joystick) and three other games. The idea is to get the packs into outlets like Wal-Mart, Sam's and Target, which means the order could balloon to 40,000 by Christmas. Bundles sell at a reduced price, but they're not too shabby nonetheless. Anita's also been running up the international phone bill, signing on **KPS Video Express in Hong Kong** and possibly ISB Trade in Israel. It could even lead to our products being translated into Hebrew. Oy vey, Avatar!
