When the CD version of Strike comes out, it's going to have full digitized speech for 16 characters, so Chris "Coppola" Roberts put out the casting call last week. 54 actors and actresses answered it.

This marks the first time ORIGIN's held open auditions. "I thought it was highly successful," said Sound Shark Randy Buck. "I feel like we've got real actors to

work with this time and it's going to make our product that much closer to an interactive movie."

Randy said the casting crew's been able to nail down most of the major roles, but there are still a few others to decide. If all goes according to schedule (and why wouldn't it?), the final cast will come back to do the actual recording for the game some time in September.

price"). "The idea," according to The Big Bulldog, Marten Davies, "is to get those bargain-hunters who are picking up the low-priced 386 systems right now. They want to build a software library and build it fast. Since there's nothing out there that can really compare to our products in terms of technology, we want those buyers to pick up these games and think, 'Wow, now I know why ORIGIN's newest games cost \$50 to \$80.' Then we'll have them hooked." The special price point is for a limited time only (120 days through Christmas), but if sales really start coooking, the offer may be extended.

Forge of Virtue, FRP's first-ever add-in disk for Ultima VII, should make a splash right before the end of August, providing it clears QA's Timex/Samsonite tests without major hiccups. Current plans now call for the top-secret ORIGIN FX Screen Saver to ship by mid-October, rather than the originally-scheduled Aug.-Sept. period, due to additional design modifications suggested by internal test-site staffers. The Bulldogs have big hopes for this one.

Then, everything breaks loose in November. Ultima VII, Part 2: The Serpent Isle (make sure you use the entire title), Strike Commander, Underworld 2 (maybe), and Trade Commander/Privateer (one of those names) will all be fighting to get out of QA at about the same time. Add duplication and build time, and you're looking at a holiday season beat-the-

clock. If all of these products make it, you'll be able to celebrate by taking your computer home for Christmas. You'll have to bring it back, of course, but to the brand new building out on 183.

(Hunt Valley, MD)—MicroProse has bought Paragon Software Corp., an independent computer game development group in Greensburg, PA. MicroProse has been marketing Paragon's titles since 1988. MP officials say Paragon's development tools will help them beef up their production of fantasy role-playing games, a category the company is getting into with the recently-delayed Darklands. Paragon, which employs 19 people, has some other products in development which MicroProse will release this year, including Mantis, a game designed specifically for CD-ROM.

(Santa Clara, CA)—Intel has pushed back the release of its nextgeneration "P5" processor that was scheduled to ship at the end of this year. New plans call for a hold until the first quarter of 1993. Intel officials say an earlier release would mean that they "wouldn't be able to ship in volume." The officials also claim they don't want to draw wafer starts from the DX2 product. Mumblings inside the industry, though, are that Intel's skittish about the same kinds of bugs which crawled out of its 386 and 486 lines (remember, these are the same folks who brought us the Step B1 bomber). Intel's also said to be reluctant to call the "P5" a "586" because of the trademark protection headaches the company's had in the past.
