#### David Ladyman reports from ComicCon and GENCON

As with all conventions, a lot of fun, too much work, too little sleep and too many miles of cement convention floors.

The trip to the San Diego Comic Book Expo (trade show) and ComicCon (consumer show) was to troll for comic book license contacts. I talked with Malibu (which now includes Image, the group that broke away from Marvel), Valiant, Harris, Marvel, Mr. T, Spiderman and Vampirella. I'll be following up with DC and Dark Horse, as well.

The most positive meetings were with Marvel and Harris. (Harris Comics are the folks who recently bought *Creepy*, *Eerie* and *Vampirella*, and are looking to expand their line with something other than superheroes. They also publish the most specialty magazines in the U.S., including mags like *Guitar World*, so they have some cash to back up their plans.)

Beginning next week or the week after, the programming department will start conducting "brown bag seminars" over lunch in the conference room on a weekly or biweekly basis. These seminars are to serve as a forum for the exchange of expertise and interest within the programming department and across projects.


Notices of upcoming seminars will be posted on the Programmers Corner bulletin board, and will include a description of the topic to be covered, who will be presenting it, and some sort of general prerequisite or guideline as to who would likely benefit from such a discussion. The idea is to have a group of people bring lunches and meet for an hour or so for informal technical discussion.

Typical topics might include general 3D-graphics techniques, texture-mapping, genetic algorithms, neural networks, writing compilers, use of the MemoryManager class, network programming, and so on.

Some topics will focus on better educating people about the code that currently exists in our libraries, while other discussions will be driven by individual interests in programming which may or may not pertain directly to the current work being done at ORIGIN.

Some meetings may venture away from programming altogether (such as



San Diego was a solo show, but we hit the Origins/GEN CON Game Faire with Warren Spector, and received valuable help from Richard G., Andrew Morris, Brennan Priest, Warren's lovely wife, Caroline, and the FCI crew: Amanda Seaman (in her convention swan song) and John Stockhausen. Paul Lidberg was a fellow traveller, promoting his new Crunchy Frog works over at the Lance and Laser booth.

We went to accumulate consumer feedback, and received that with a vengeance. In addition to four seminars (average attendance about 40), we were deluged with more than a thousand completed questionnaires. ## Mike Harrison


#### New Depth in Marketing

Marketing Monarch Mike
Harrison works on the first floor of
ORIGIN West. But not too long ago,
he reported to work on the muddy
floor of the Choptank River on
Maryland's eastern shore. "From
September through March for seven
years, I spent five to ten hours a day
picking up oysters from the bottom of
the river. I also worked underwater
for a Louisiana construction company," Mike recalls. "I'd do things
like drill holes in bridge footings so
the demolition guys could blow them
up."

That's just a snapshot from an anything-but-ordinary career. Here's how it tracks: radio/tv college student — documentary maker deckhand on a crab boat - equipment tender on a commercial diving barge — underwater construction worker — oyster and clam diver college student (again) — newspaper reporter — freelance reporter technical writer — MicroProse Media Relations Manager — MicroProse Marketing Services Manager freelance writer and consultant — ORIGIN Marketing Director. "The jobs just kind of came up for various reasons. Opportunities presented themselves, and if they were anything that I had an interest in, I'd give them a try."

For four consecutive years,
Mike had the distinction of being
ORIGIN's most frequent nonemployee. Every Fall would find him
in New Hampshire or Austin.
"ORIGIN was one my first clients as
a freelancer and accounted for about
40% of my business," he says. When
the position of Marketing Director
came up here, VP/GM Fred
Schmidt wanted to duplicate the
Maryland Miracle (Fred hired Mike
at MicroProse) and the rest, as they
say, is histoire.

Mike oversees the crews in Creative Services, Public/Media Relations and Publications. He also




creates ORIGIN's advertising concepts and placement while looking for strategic marketing possibilities. Despite his technicolor resume, Mike knows where he wants to go in the future. "I see a lot of room for growth in the department—especially in the continued development of publishing projects, increased sales support and crossmarketing opportunities, and direct marketing. Now that we have a database from our registration cards, I want to support our customers on a personal level. The first part of that plan is ORIGIN's first consumer newsletter this Fall. I think we can build our company identity by giving ORIGIN game players the 'inside story' and making them feel like they get more than just a game when they buy our products. We're also expanding our one-on-one online communications in places like CompuServe, America Online and GEnie."

Mike may even have a hand in game design someday. His addiction to golf is no secret, and he'd like to see ORIGIN do a golfing game, a la Links or Jack Nicklaus Signature Edition. His sporting expertise makes him a natural, but he'll probably steer clear of the programming. "When I applied for the technical writer's position, it was at a company which produced computer accounting systems. They told me nobody had ever scored lower on the computer aptitude test. But they liked my writing."



How about sales figures for some of our products (a la SO2, U7 and Underworld)?


